O Come, O Come, Emmanuel was written by monks in the 9th century. It was part of a collection of hymns which were sung in the days leading up to Christmas. O Come, O Come Emmanuel was sung on Christmas Eve. The original version contained 7 stanzas. Each stanza draws our attention to the coming Messiah, specifically through the names given to the coming Messiah from the Old Testament. As we study the theology behind the carol, we will notice how Emmanuel provides hope. Emmanuel is the hope the world needs.
