October 31, 2021 The Sufficiency of the Sacrifice Hebrews 10:1-18

Hebrews 10 explains the great sufficiency of Jesus' sacrifice. It does this by comparing the Old Testament sacrificial system with the sacrifice He made. The writer states the sacrificial system was only a shadow of something better to come. Shadows provide only a faint glimpse of the reality they depict. Shadows also cannot do what the real can. The sacrifices, though prescribed by God, were not sufficient to effect salvation. The something better to come was the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross. The sacrificial system was the shadow of His sacrifice. Now through Jesus' sacrifice the totality of the law is fulfilled. Since the law is fulfilled through His sacrifice, then His sacrifice is sufficient to effect salvation.
